January 1, 1864 - August 9, 1865

Note: On August 11, 1862, Rezin F. Mumma enlisted in the Civil War at Decatur, Indiana, and served in Co. H 89th Indiana Volunteers. He was sworn into service at Indianapolis on August 28, 1862.

The diary begins January 1, 1864, and ends with his return to his home in Adams County on August 9, 1865. Mrs. Herald Hitchcock, granddaughter, inherited the diary. In copying the diary, only punctuation was added to make the transcript easier to read. Also serving in the same unit was Rezin's brother, George Washington Mumma, to whom he refers to by the nickname "Wash".

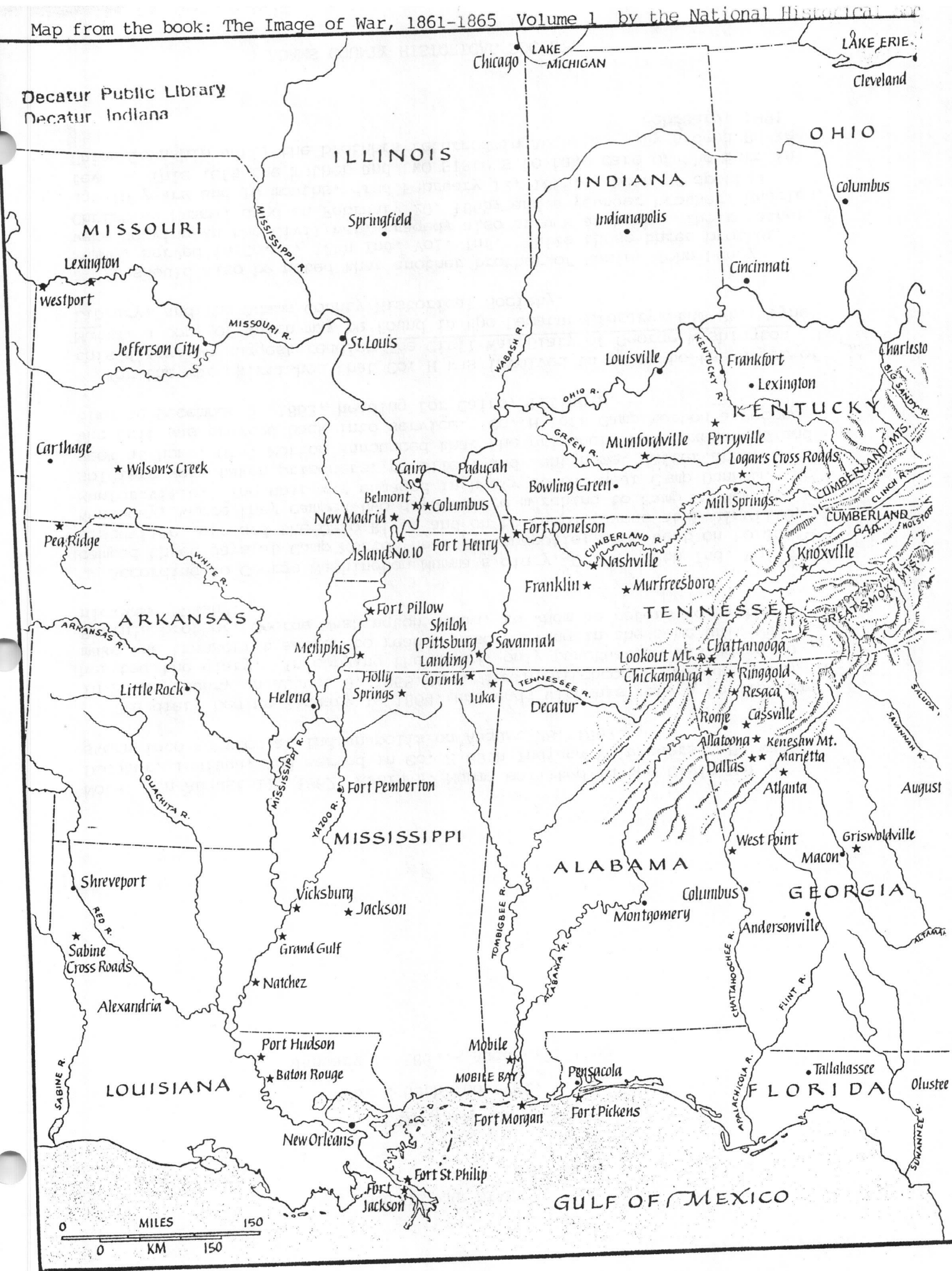
According to George Washington Mumma's diary, Co. H. 89th Ind. Vol. camped three days at Camp Morton near Indianapolis; then went on to Jeffersonville, crossed the Ohio River and on to Camp Cravens at Louisville, Kentucky, where they camped two days before marching to Camp Dunham at Munfordville. The unit was engaged in heavy combat near Camp Dunham. The soldiers were taken prisoners, paroled, and sent home. After about a week at home, Gov. Morton announced that the prisoners were exchanged and the unit was pressed back into service. Co. H left Camp Morton a second time on December 5, 1863, heading for Cairo, Illinois.

For the war skirmishes that Co. H was involved in prior to the start of this diary, we suggest reading The Civil War Diary of George Washington Mumma, a copy of which may be found in the Decatur Library, the Ft. Wayne Library, and The Adams County Historical Society.

It should also be noted that another brother of Rezin, John Henry Mumma, served in Co. I, 12th Ind. Vol. Inf. While these three brothers were serving in the Civil War, tragedy also struck at home. Their father, Christian Mumma, died on February 20, 1865, and a younger brother, Charles, age 16 years and 10 months, died February 12, 1865, - both of spotted fever. This left the mother and two sisters to take care of the farm in Union Township until the brothers returned in August.

January, Friday, 1 1864
I just came off of pickett this morning. It is raining like everything. All quiet in Camp and plenty of apples to eat.

January, Saturday, 2 1864
All quiet in Camp. Nothing but cold weather and so on

January, Sunday, 3 1864
All in Camp yet and nothing to do but picket and that is only about every day.

January, Monday, 4 1864
Very icy. It is so slippery that a person can hardly get about. I was on picket. We had a nice time of it, was rather cold. We shot lots of birds today.

January, Tuesday, 5 1864
Cold in Camp and nothing but good times. All quiet.

January, Wednesday, 6 1864
It is a little warmer today and not very much either.

January, Thursday, 7 1864
It is moderating all day and the snow is about all gone.

January, Friday, 8 1864
Today we received some grub from home, some apple butter, sausage, beef steaks, and fat cakes. I tell you they tasted good.

January, Saturday, 9 1864
All quiet in Camp. Just come off of picket. It was nice today. I went out a hunting.

January, Sunday, 10 1864
In Camp all day and no news. Nothing of any particular going on in Camp today.

January, Monday, 11 1864
Today we bought a barrel of apples. We paid three dollars for them. The weather is tolerably cool.

January, Tuesday, 12 1864
Call in Camp. We had coffee and Beans Bread for dinner and also sow belly

January, Wednesday, 13 1864
All in Camp and around the family stoves that we have in our tents. We can make them as warm as a house.

January, Thursday, 14 1864
We went on guard to day. Jones Kline come to camp. I was detailed to go up the River, took six days Rations and got on board the Desmoines.

January, Friday, 15 1864
We are on picket all day at Bradlies landing while the dakies holling corn. We had wild goose for dinner. It is very muddy.

January, Saturday, 16 1864
Still at the same place getting corn. We went out a wild goose hunting. All quiet. We saw lots but could not shoot at any of them.

January, Sunday, 17 1864
We have the boat about half loaded. The corn plenty. The weather fine.

January, Monday, 18 1864
Today we will get the boat loaded. All we will take. We have about the boat half loaded. The weather fine.

January, Tuesday, 19 1864
We started back to day. Last night we were expected to be attacked but nothing come up to interfere. We landed at Memphis at 4 oclock.

January, Wednesday, 20 1864
We had general Review and inspection. General Hunter inspected us. The weather was muddy.

January, Thursday, 21 1864
In Camp all day and nothing but fun.

January, Friday, 22 1864
There was Regimental inspection and one of Hurlbert staff inspected us. All quiet.

January, Saturday, 23 1864
We have orders to be ready to move. We are going to take the field.

January, Sunday, 24 1864
We are to be ready till the 26 of this month and that will soon come to hand.

January, Monday, 25 1864
We pulled stakes today and are a going tomorrow to make a raid in Mississippi and so hear goes---

January, Tuesday, 26 1864
We left camp east of Memphis today at 5 oclock going to the landing. There we stayed all night.

January, Wednesday, 27 1864
We are still at the landing. The weather is pleasant today. We got on board the Rose Hambleton 1, $\frac{1}{2}$, oclock and landed in Arkansas at 2 oclock. There we prepared 5 days rations to eat going down the river.

January, Thursday, 28 1864
We got on board the Rose Hambleton again after having cooked our rations we went on board the boat at 7 oclock and landed at Memphis at 8, laying there till 11 then we started down the river.

January, Friday, 29 1864
We passed Helleney, Ark. at 8 oclock after night. Today we
White and Arkansas river. The weather very foggy.

January, Saturday, 30 1864
We are still on the boats. We landed at Vicksburg today at
4 oclock P.M. The weather fine.

January, Sunday, 31 1864
We are still at the landing. Last night it rained like everything
and that was not so pleasant for we had no shelter - only what
we could make with our rubber blankets.

February, Monday, 1 1864
We left the River and marched about 7 miles. We left the landing
at 11 oclock and stoped marching that day and last night it rained
pitchforks and that didn't feel good.

February, Tuesday, 2 1864
Today we left the Vicksburg hills starting at 6 oclock marching
till 9 after night when we went to camp and was glad of it for
we was all tired. The weather still fine.

February, Wednesday, 3 1864
We still continued our march stopping for dinner 6 miles from
Black River at 5 oclock P.M. and eating supper at 9 oclock. We
crossed the river that night. The weather fair.

February, Thursday, 4 1864
We left Black River at 8 oclock marching till noon. By spells
we had to double quick at one o.cl. Our division was formed in
line of Battle. We were then 23 miles from Jackson. We had no
fight there.

February, Friday, 5 1864
We again pursued the rebels skirmishing with them and shelling
them which was a . The Rebs made a charge on our Battery
but was badly whipped and we took one piece. Tonight we are 4
miles from Jackson.

February, Saturday, 6 1864
Our company was sent out on picket. Veach and his staff passed
us. The weather still fine and we all in good hart. Turner
was shot by accident in Co. C. and left at .

February, Sunday, 7 1864
We got to Jackson at 10 oclock today we marched 12 miles beyond
Jackson. There we camped in the woods. The weather still fine
and all right.

February, Monday, 8 1864
Passing through Brandon at 9 oclock this morning. The boys took
everything they could get. The weather fine. Got a lot of meal
there.

February, Tuesday, 9 1864
Rations issued to us this morning, 2½ crackers for three days.

Today we captured 300 rebels and five pieces of artillery. Marched till 11 oclock after night. The weather fine.

February Wednesday 1864
Marching 12 miles Camp D in the woods. 20 miles from Decatur. We has
slabjacks for supper. The weather fine.

February Thursday, 11 1864
We left Camp this morning at 8 oclock, marching slowly all forenoon. In the afternoon we was cracked, then marching till 10:00 afternigh. The weather fine.

February Friday, 12 1864
We got up this morning at 4 marching like forty. We neither give the Rebs
time to eat or sleep. We captured 3 cannons and forty prisoners. Today
all 3

February Saturday, 13 1864
Marching moderately slow owing to some obstruction which being put in By
the rebels. We routed them out of their Camps this evening. We marched
till 10 after night.

February Sunday, 14 1864
We had a fight near Maridian. The rebs had to leave double quick we got
to at 4 oclock. We camped west of town. The country hilly, the town
destroyed all hunk of

February Monday, 15 1864
It rained some more straddle Bucks this morning. We left Meridian today
at 3 oclock, marched two miles, there we camped that night. The weather
cool.

February Tuesday, 16 1864
It is very foggy this morning. Today we destroyed part of the railroad
mobeal Ohio east of Meridian.

February Wednesday, 17 1864
We left Meridian today at 3 oclock. Came to Marion station at 5PM. We
camped 2 miles north of Marion. The weather fine.

February Thursday, 18 1864
A little snow this morning. Laying in Camp all day. The weather cold.

February Friday, 19 1864
Still in Camp. The weather cold and windy and I and my pardner went out
and killed a hog and we had a good supper.

February Saturday, 20 1864
Started back this morning. Our grub was parched corn and rye, coffee.
The country hilly. The weather fine.

February Sunday, 21 1864
Marched hard all day and nothing to eat but ham meat, rye, coffee and
parched corn. We drew no grub for 9 days. All we got to eat we had
to forage. We went 19 miles today.

February Monday, 22 1864
 Marched 18 miles, the country hilly. A little fight today. Some of our men captured. The weather fine.

February Tuesday, 23 1864
 Marching 9½ miles and then resting. 4½ miles from Hillsborrow. Marching to Hillsborrow today. The country hilly. The weather fine.

February Wednesday, 24 1864
 Marching 16 miles guarding the train. The country hilly, weather fine.

February Thursday, 25 1864
 Marching 5 miles. Camped near Perl river. 12 miles from Canton. The country level, weather fine.

February Friday, 26 1864
 Crossed Perl River at 8 in the morning. Marched 14 miles, passed through Canton at 9 oclock, marched 2 miles beyond the town. Then we camped. The country level.

February Saturday, 27 1864
 Laying in Camp all day. We had a bully breakfast. We had honey, molasses, corn cakes, coffee, pork & . The weather fine. A nice village.

February Sunday, 28 1864
 Laying in Camp all day. Bully grub. The weather windy and cloudy.

February Monday, 29 1864
 Our Company was grinding corn all day at McBrides mill, 2 miles from Canton. The weather fine.

March Tuesday, 1 1864
 This morning we again took up our line of march again. It rained like everything all forenoon. Marching 18 miles going Livingston at 4 oclock. 13 miles from Canton. Roads muddy.

March Wednesday, 2 1864
 The rear of our army had rite smart of fighting to do; the most was cannonading. We marched 10 miles. The weather fine.

March Thursday, 3 1864
 We marched 20 miles. Passing through Brownsville at 10. Intersected the road where we went out on where we was formed in line of battle. Coming to Meridian. There we ate our dinner. Come to Black River at sunset. Camped.

March Friday, 4 1864
 Left Black River at 9 in the morning. Marched to Vicksburg that day till sunset. Distance 20 miles. The country hilly. The weather fine.

March Saturday, 5 1864
 Lay in camp all day. We had Company inspection. The weather fine.

March Sunday, 6 1864
 In camp all day and no grub for dinner. Draded? Rations in evening we drew. Weather fine.

March

March Monday, 7 1864
In camp all day; plenty to eat. I was to town. The weather fine.

March Tuesday, 8 1864
It is very foggy this morning. Today we left Camp east of Vicksburgh and went to the landing below town. Stayed in the levee all day.

March Wednesday, 9 1864
We got on board the Boat Chouteau at 11. We lay there til evening. Then the boat moved up the river $\frac{1}{2}$ mile. There we lay all night. The weather foggy.

March Thursday, 10 1864
At 10 oclock we moved back to the same place we got on the steamer started on the expedition at 6 oclock this eveing. Passed along smoothly all night.

March Friday, 11 1864
Passed Natchez at day light. Come to Read River Landing a $1\frac{1}{2}$ oclock.

March Saturday, 12 1864
Left Read River landing at 11 oclock and went up old Miss. Passed the mouth of Read River at oclock.; stayed in the Atchafalaya Bayou 15 miles from the Miss River.

March Sunday, 13 1864
We went out on a scout expecting a fight. Wash(ington) went with us 4 miles. He got to sick. He could not go it at all. In the evening we came back to where we got off of the boat.

March Monday, 14 1864
We again pushed the Rebels. All went smooth till we got to Derussy. The first we knew was bum out of 64 pounder rifle. I tell you it was not so nice. Took 365 PRIS and 10 cannons.

March Tuesday, 15 1864
We lay at Derussy all day. The transports come to us in the evening. Then we got on board the boats again leaving for Alexandria. The weather still fine.

March Wednesday, 16 1864
On the boat all day. Arrived at Alexandria at 5 PM. The rebels had all left the town first in time not to be taken prisoners.

March Thursday, 17 1864
In camp south of Alex. Our Company was on duty in town patrolling the streets. The weather fine.

March Friday, 18 1864
In camp all day. Eating Belly ? or taffee all day. The weather fine.

March Saturday, 19 1864
In camp all day and nothing to do but eat and drink and sleep.

March Sunday, 20 1864
Still in camp. Plenty to eat and drink. To draw rations today.

March Monday, 21 1864
 Started on a scout. We had a little scratched with the rebs. We marched 20 miles till 1½ PM. Then we stayed there while some of our forces surrounded the rebs. At 11 oclock after night we made them surrender. There were 365 of them. They had 4 pieces of artillery.

March Tuesday, 22 1864
 Camped within 1½ miles of where the Rebs were at Henderson hill. That next day at 12 we started back to Alexandria. Went within 9 miles of it and camped for the night.

March Wednesday, 23 1864
 We come to camp at Alexandria 12 oclock; then we fixed up our tents again. The weather fine.

March Thursday, 24 1864
 In camp all day and drawed beef. Then for some beef dinner. It was raining all day.

March Friday, 25 1864
 In camp all day. Drawed rations today; preparing to leave in the morning. The weather fine.

March Saturday, 26 1864
 Started for Shreveport. Marched 18 miles. Went out on the same road we went when we took them prisoners and 4 pieces artillery.

March Sunday, 27 1864
 Marched to Read River. Distance from Alexandria 25 miles. There we got on the boats in a days. It rained after night.

March Monday, 28 1864
 Camp all day. We had a few games of ball for the first time since we left Indianapolis, Ind. The weather fine.

March Tuesday, 29 1864
 In camp all day and nothing going on of any important.

March Wednesday, 30 1864
 Got in the boat and went down the river 2 miles to get wood for the boat. The weather fine.

March Thursday, 31 1864
 We had monthly inspection, then in the evening went on picket. We killed a beef, taking nothing but the heart and liver. We had a good supper.

April Friday, 1 1864
 We were released from picket in the evening taking two hogs with us in camp. We had plenty of meat for several days.

April Saturday, 2 1864
 We got on board the boat at 8 oclock laying there till 1. Then we are again sailed for Shreveport the boat running nearly all night. The weather fair.

April Sunday, 3 1864
 Still in the boat and sailing along smoothly. The weather fair.

April Monday, 4 1864
We got off of the boat this morning. We got plenty of pork and we had Company drill in the afternoon. The weather fair.

April Tuesday, 5 1864
We had battallion drill in the fore and afternoon and fine time in camp. The weather fair.

April Wednesday, 6 1864
We got up this morning at 4 oclock and got ready to march till daylight. At 7 the order was countermanded. At 1 oclock we crossed the river on the Dismoine to forage. Came back at 8 oclock after night.

April Thursday, 7 1864
Started the morning for Shreveport. We marched 15 miles and it rained all afternoon like forty.

April Friday, 8 1864
Marching slowly all forenoon but in the afternoon we was put through we marched till 8 oclock after night.

April Saturday, 9 1864
We got up at 1 oclock and drew two days ration to eat while engaged in fighting. The ball opened at 1 oclock and lasted till dark. Aron Archer and Joshua Parrish wounded.

April Sunday, 10 1864
Retreated 20 miles then camped for the night in the woods. The rebels skirmishing with our rear. The weather fair.

April Monday, 11 1864
Arrived in Grand Ecore this evening but did not get in camp till dark and had nothing to eat. That was the trouble.

April Tuesday, 12 1864
In camp north of Grand Ecore. Nothing particular going on. We drew two days ration this evening. I got four letters.

April Wednesday, 13 1864
In camp all day till towards evening. Then we were ordered into line of battle expecting the rebels to attack us but they did not come.

April Thursday, 14 1864
In camp all day and every thing quiet. Our transport came down this evening they being badly cut up by the rebels but they all got back. The weather fair.

April Friday, 15 1864
In camp all day polishing our quarters, taking all the filth off. That is all we had to do.

April Saturday, 16 1864
We had Brigade inspection. Nothing else particular going on. I wrote several letters in the afternoon. The weather fair.

April Sunday, 17 1864
In camp all day. Wm. Shaffer came to our camp this morning. We had a gay old time while together.

April Monday, 18 1864
Still in camp and nothing particular going on. Everything quiet on the picket line. The weather fair.

April Tuesday, 19 1864
We was ordered up long before day to be ready for the enemy but they did not come. The weather fair.

April Wednesday, 20 1864
We left Grand Ecore and went to Natchitoches nearly on the double quick. Our company was on picket. The rest of the regiment was in line of battle.

April Thursday, 21 1864
In line of battle all day. The pickets changed a few shots with the enemy. At 1 o.c. in the night we left Natchitoches marched across the Bayou. There we lay till 4 oclock.

April Friday, 22 1864
Marched all day and all night till 3 oclock. Skirmishing with the rebels all afternoon.

April Saturday, 23 1864
Heavy cannonading all forenoon but the rebs had to leave on the double quick. We charged their lines taking three pieces of artillery and 90 prisoners.

April Sunday, 24 1864
Marched hard all day and till 9 oclock after night. We arrived at Sandy point at that hour. We had a small fight this morning but the rebs had to leave.

April Monday, 25 1864
Marched within 14 miles of Alexandria. There we camped for the night. Skirmishes with the Rebels by shells all day. The weather fair.

April Tuesday, 26 1864
We tried to catch the rebs in a trap but they smelled a mice and did not come up far enough but still we got to shoot at them a little. The weather fair. Come to Alexandria this evening.

April Wednesday 1864
In camp all day and nothing to do but eat and drink. We saw Uncle Rezins boys today for the first time in 12 years.

April Thursday, 28 1864
In camp till dinner. Then we was ordered into line of battle. We lay in line all that day and all night but no Rebels come to see.

April Friday, 29 1864
This morning we went in camp again. Nothing strange going on. The weather very hot.

April Saturday, 30 1864
In camp all day and nothing particular going on. All quiet on the picket lines. The weather dry and hot.

May Sunday, 1 1864
All quiet in camp. In the evening we moved camp out about 4 miles toward

Fort Derussy. The weather fair.

May	Monday, 2	1864
The Rebels fired in our forrage train. Then our men took after them and made them scaddle. We camped on the Centerville road 4 miles from Alexandria.		
May	Tuesday, 3	1864
In camp all day and nothing to do but there is some skirmishing on the picket line. The weather is very fine and the roads are very dirty.		
May	Wednesday, 4	1864
Some hard fighting this morning 5 miles from our camp but we did not go out. Our cavalry was enough for them. They made the rebels leave.		
May	Thursday, 5	1864
Fighting like everything all day. The Rebels crossed the Bayou bridge, then burnt it. We camped on the west side of the Bayou.		
May	Friday, 6	1864
Moved out about three miles further. There we stayed. The calvary had right smart of a fight. Our Company was on picket. The weather fine.		
May	Saturday, 7	1864
Skirmishing commenced at 8 oclock. The Battery opened on them at 10. In the afternoon our Company was sent out for skirmishes. A general engagement commenced at 5 oclock in the evening. Three wounded.		
May	Sunday, 8	1864
In camp all day. Some little skirmishes on the picket lines. We had nothing to do but eat and drink. The weather fair.		
May	Monday, 9	1864
We lay in camp all day and nothing particular going on. The weather warm and dry.		
May	Tuesday, 10	1864
We have a shower of rain, then it cleared off. Skirmishing commenced at 1 oclock. The Rebels were repulsed and driven back.		
May	Wednesday, 11	1864
All quiet in camp. We drew days rations. Company A & H are detailed for picket. We go to the Widow Flowers farm to do picket duty. The calvary picket were fired into.		
May	Thursday, 12	1864
We remained on picket till 6 oclock in the evening. Co. G. and C. relieved us. We drew days rations of coffee, beans, pork, and hard tack.		
May	Friday, 13	1864
All quiet in camp. We got orders to leave in the morning at 5 oclock. Co. E., I., K., F. go on picket. The 119 Ill. moved out tonight.		
May	Saturday, 14	1864
We left camp this morning at 5 oclock; started for Fort DeRussy, distance 30 miles. The rebs fired into our transport but the gunboats soon made them scaddle.		

May Sunday, 15 1864
We lay by this morning till the 19 Army Corp passed us. They passed all night.

May Monday, 16 1864
Marching slowly all day. Come to Ft. Derussy at 11 oclock after night. The 19 Army Corp had right smart of fighting to do today. We marched miles today.

May Tuesday, 17 1864
The 47th come up to us this morning at daylight. They marched nearly all night. We come to Scernes fortifications and there we lay all night. Heavy cannonading this evening.

May Wednesday, 18 1864
Crossed the Bayou this morning; formed in line of battle along the Bayou 3 miles from Sims fort and the Atchafalaya Bayou. Some skirmishing in the rear. The darkies tearin the ??

May Thursday, 19 1864
The weather warm. All quiet in the rear this morning. No fighting today. We lay in camp all day. At 11 oclock last night we was routed up to guard the train across the Bayou.

May Friday, 20 1864
Helping the train across the Bayou. The weather hot and dry. We crossed the Bayou at 7 oclock P.M. in the evening. Our Company marched by the Bayou about 6 miles and there camped and waiting for the Regt to come up. Banks passed all night.

May Saturday, 21 1864
The Regt. come in the morning at 7 o. c. Then we marched to the Mississippi, distance 5 miles. We lay there till 8 o.c. after night. Then we got on board the Steamer Marmora. Then we lay all night.

May Sunday, 22 1864
Started for Vicksburg at 10½. We drew pork today for the first for a long time. The weather very warm and we are awfully crowded on the boat but still goes better then walking.

May Monday, 23 1864
Still on the boat and going towards Vicksburg like forty. We passed Natchez at 12 o. c. last night. Our boat stopped awhile at that place.

May Tuesday, 24 1864
Landed at Vicksburg. We got off of the boat at 8 o.c. A.M. All quiet at Vicksburg. The weather fair.

May Wednesday, 25 1864
In camp all day and nothing particular going on. We drew rations in the afternoon. Plenty to eat and drink.

May Thursday, 26 1864
Still in camp and nothing particular going on. Everything quiet in the city. The weather fair.

May Friday, 27 1864
In camp all day and nothing to do but eat and sleep and of which I can do my share at all times. The weather still fair.

May Saturday, 28 1864
Still in camp. The weather cloudy. Some prospects of rain. All quiet at and around the city.

May Sunday, 29 1864
In camp all day and nothing particular going on. The weather fair again.

May Monday, 30 1864
Still in camp. We had dress parade this evening for the first time. Since we left Vicksburg all quiet in the city. The weather fair.

May Tuesday, 31 1864
Still in camp. A little rain in the afternoon. Nothing particular going on. No particular news from before.

June Wednesday, 1 1864
We drew rations today. We drew potatoes, ham, sugar, coffee, sourcrout, and light bread. A little rain. Dress parade in the evening.

June Thursday, 2 1864
In camp still and all quiet in the city. We had company drill. The weather very warm.

June Friday, 3 1864
We got on board the Steamer Chouteau. We lay on the boat. All at the landing. It rained like forty.

June Saturday, 4 1864
Left Vicksburg at 11½ oclock passing along smoothly all day. The weather fair.

June Sunday, 5 1864
On the boat till evening. Then we got off of the boat to go after the rebels. We lay there till morning. Some rain through the night.

June Monday, 6 1864
Started out bright and early. General engagement commenced at 12 oclock. The rebels had to leave but our loss was dreadful. It rained all day.

June Tuesday, 7 1864
We come to the river at 12 oclock. A mighty bad day on the Yankees. We got on board the boat at 3 oclock at what is called Smiths Landing. The weather fair.

June Wednesday, 8 1864
Started for Vicksburg at daylight. A little rain through the night. Come to White River in the evening. Stopped there about 2 hours.

June Thursday, 9 1864
Passed Helleny at 9 oclock. Sailed along smoothly. A little rain in the afternoon. Come to Mephis at midnight.

June Friday, 10 1864
Memphis looks very natural. The landing is just crowded with bread peddlers and lookers on. The weather fair. Left the landing at 12 oclock and went to camp.

June Saturday, 11 1864
In camp west of town one mile. Nothing strange going on. Drew rations. We have nothing to do but eat and drink. The weather very fair.

June Sunday 12 1864
Still in camp but have marching orders with three days rations in our haversacks. The weather fair.

June Monday, 13 1864
In camp yet and nothing particular going on. All quiet around the city. The weather fair.

June Tuesday, 14 1864
Still in camp. Nothing to do but drill one hour in the morning from 7 till 8.

June Wednesday, 15 1864
In camp yet. We have orders to be ready to march tomorrow. The weather fine.

June Thursday, 16 1864
William A. Wisner and Blood come to camp this morning at an early hour. The weather fair. R. F. Mumma

June Friday, 17 1864
Still in camp all day and nothing particular going on. The weather fine.

June Saturday, 18 1864
Still in camp all day and nothing to do but eat and drink and that is not hard to do at this time for we are all hearty but my pardner. He is not well at all.

June Sunday, 19 1864
In camp all day and nothing particular going on. The weather fair.

June Monday, 20 1864
We drew 4 months pay. I went to the city and bought me one shirt for 1 dollar and $\frac{1}{2}$ half. I bought it on front Roe next the River.

June Tuesday, 21 1864
All quiet in camp today. Wash (his brother) went to town and bought a coffee pot for 60 cents. A little rain. The weather very hot.

June Wednesday, 22 1864
Still in camp and nothing to do. All quiet on the picket line. The weather fair.

June Thursday, 23 1864
Had Reville at the regular hour. We then got orders to pack up and get ready to leave at 8 oclock. We marched to the Jackson depot. Then we got into the cars and start for Collierville then guarded the wagon train to Moscow.

June Friday, 24 1864
This morning we again marched. We got on the wagons. We come to Moscow at 8 oclock. We camped on the west side of Moscow on Wolf River rite in the woods.

June Saturday, 25 1864
All quiet in camp. Still more troops coming in. Colonel Murray comes out and the remainder of the Regiment or Battery Brigade and also a Brigade of colored troops come out.

June Sunday, 26 1864
We have Division Review and inspection at 8:30 A. M. We were reviewed by Colonel More of the 21 Mo. Regt. commanding the 3 divisions, 16 Army Corp. The weather fair.

June Monday, 27 1864
We left camp at Moscow at 5 oclock A.M. and started for Lagrange and marched slow and steady. We got to Lagrange at 12 oclock and camped on the west side of the town on Wolf River. The weather fair.

June Tuesday, 28 1864
All quiet in camp. We fixed us up some shade. The Captain and orderly are busy making out the pay roll. The weather fair.

June Wednesday, 29 1864
All quiet in camp. Lieutenant Browning come to the Company. The weather very warm and sultry.

June Thursday, 30 1864
Still in camp and all quiet around LaGrange. We got late northern papers; no particular news. I went to the river to take a wash off.

July Friday, 1 1864
All quiet in camp. We got some dried fruit from the commissary. We had a good dinner. The weather warm. I go to the river and take a bathe.

July Saturday, 2 1864
All quiet in camp. We got no mail from the north for several days. A nice shower of rain in the afternoon. I sent 30 dollars to John.

July Sunday, 3 1864
Our Company took up quarters about 200 yards further up the creek. We have the nicest place for camp of any Company in the Regiment.

July Monday, 4 1864
Still in camp. All quiet around LaGrange. The weather very warm.

July Tuesday, 5 1864
Left LaGrange at 5 oclock. Marched 5 miles. There we stayed for the night. The weather very warm.

July Wednesday, 6 1864
Are having Reville at 3 oclock. Started out at 7. We traveled slow and steady; went in camp at 4. The weather warm.

July Thursday, 7 1864
Have Reville at 2½ oclock and started on our march at sunrise. The 3rd

Division goes in front and the first Brigade in front of the Division, the 89th in front of the Brigade.

July Friday, 8 1864
We had Reveille at 2½ oclock. We started out at 7 oclock, the 89th being the extreme rear. We guarded the supply train. We got into Ripley at 11 and going into camp at 4 miles south west of town traveling 8 miles. The weather warm.

July Saturday, 9 1864
We had Reveille at 2 oclock; started out at 5; go very slow and steady. We crossed the Talahatchie River and camped at New Albany. We drew 2 days rations and some beef. The weather fair.

July Sunday, 10 1864
Have Reveille at 3 oclock and started out at 7. We went a steady gate. We go in camp at 2 oclock. Slight skirmishing on front.

July Monday, 11 1864
Had Reveille at 2 oclock; started at 6 and went as far as yontatack(?) 7 miles from where we started. The calvary had a little skermishing with the rebs.

July Tuesday, 12 1864
Had Reveille at 3. We then started on the Tupelo Road. We go with in one mile of . There we camped in line of battle all night and nothing to eat and scarcely to drink.

July Wednesday, 13 1864

July Thursday, 14 1864
We got up at 4 oclock. Moved our line up on the hill further. The whole army was moved in line. The enemy made the attact at 7 in the morning. They were driven back with heavy loss.

July Friday, 15 1864
We started on the skirmishing line at 6 A.M. We relieved Co. I. We lay in line till 9. Then we was ordered back to our Regiment. Then we started LaGrange. Camped 5 miles from Tupelo. The battle was at Harrisburgh 2 miles up from Tupelo.

July Saturday, 16 1864
The first Division started out in front. Some skermishing in the rear. We went into camp one mile south of Elis after traveling 12 miles. The rebs attacked the rear and drove in our skirmishes but a few shells from the 3 Battery settled them.

July Sunday, 17 1864
Come off of the picket line at daybreak. We got as far as New Albany. There we rested for the night on the east side of the river. The weather fair.

July Monday, 18 1864
Have Reveille at 2 oclock. Started out at 4. Passing the 1st Division. Marching till 5 oclock. Then we go into camp. Marched 20 miles. The weather fair.

July Tuesday, 19 1864
 Started out at daylight; going as far as Salem. Distance 15 miles. There the supply train met us coming from LaGrange. We drew three days grub.

July Wednesday, 20 1864
 Have Reveille at 3 oclock. Started out at 8. We go into camp at Davis Mill. Marched 12 miles. The weather very warm.

July Thursday, 21 1864
 Have Reveille at 8 oclock. Started out at five, going to LaGrange. Distance 5 miles. We got to LaGrange at 8 oclock. We go in camp at our old camping ground.

July Friday, 22 1864
 We lay in camp till 1 oclock. Then we got orders to get ready to leave. We left at 3 o.c. for Moscow. Distance 9 miles. Got to camp at sunset. The weather fair.

July Saturday, 23 1864
 Have Reveille at 2 oclock. Started for Colliarville at daybreak. Distance 15 miles. Got to Colliarville at 11 o.c. Got on the cars and started for Memphis. Got to Memphis at 4 oclock P.M.

July Sunday 24 1864
 We got some mail from the north. Moved our camp further towards town and handier to water. The weather fair.

July Monday, 25 1864
 I went to town and got my watch fixed and returned to camp and we had a mess of roasting ears for dinner. Nothing going on in camp particular.

July Tuesday, 26 1864
 All quiet in camp today. The sun shines to its utmost heat. It is very dusty on the roads. We draw half rations of light bread. The weather is fine.

July Wednesday, 27 1864
 I and Smith went to town and got 30 pounds of flour for one dollar and we are a going to have some biscuits for dinner and we are a going to have some dumplins for supper.

July Thursday, 28 1864
 All quiet in camp. We had roasting ears all day for 3 meals. O they was good. The weather fine.

July Friday, 29 1864
 All quiet in camp and we had dumplings for dinner and Wash ate so much that it made me sick. But he soon got over it. He spued and shit.

July Friday, 29 1864
 All quiet in camp. We had coffee and meat and good dip and bread and pie and that is a very good meal for soldiers. I was on guard at headquarters.

July Sunday, 31 1864
 On guard all day at the Brigade headquarters. We had slabjacks for supper. All quiet. We had dress parade at 7 oclock. Nothing going on in camp but fun all fun.

- August Monday, 1 1864
All quiet in camp. It looks like if it mite rain. My pardner has come back and he is in the fort and I went to see him. He gave me sour whisky to drink.
- August Tuesday 2 1864
George and I went to town and we bought some potatoes and some cucumbers and some red beets. We had a good dinner.
- August Wednesday, 3 1864
We packed our knapsacks and stored them. The wagons started out on the Pigeon Bu te? Road and it rained some today.
- August Thursday, 4 1864
It rained last night a good shower. We had some fun yesterday throwing shells at each other and ? .
- August Friday, 5 1864
On guard today. All quiet in camp. We hear that we will leave in the morning. The weather hot and rain.
- August Saturday, 6 1864
In camp yet. We had crout and bread for dinner and coffee. The sun shines hot. It will rain before long.
- August Sunday, 7 1864
We left camp at 6½ oclock A.M. Go to the Jackson depot. We lay there about 2 hours. We was then ordered to go to our camp again and remain until further orders. We had tomatoes for supper.
- August Monday, 8 1864
We left camp at 7 oclock and went to the Jackson depot and arms. Lay there about one hour and then crawled on the cars and left. Arrived here at 3 oclock Hollow Springs.
- August Tuesday, 9 1864
All quiet in camp. The supply train left this morning to go to Hachie River. We had Roastin ears all day and stewed apples. It rained today.
- August Wednesday, 10 1864
We was out a forageing today. We got some roastin ears and killed a hog and then come to camp. It rained a little.
- August Thursday, 11 1864
We left camp at half past ten and marched about 4 miles south and was ordered back. Then at 6 we left Hollow Springs and got on the cars. We arrive here at 12 oclock LaGrange.
- August Friday, 12 1864
All quiet in camp. We fixed up camp today. Pretty comfortable. It rained like forty. I went out to forrage after the rain. I got peaches and cabbage.
- August Saturday, 13 1864
Come off of picket this morning. All quiet. We had inspection. Went on instead of off.

August Sunday, 14 1864
 came off and Wash (brother) went on so all quiet in camp.
 There was meeting in town tonight. LaGrange.

August Monday, 15 1864
 We went on drill skirmish. Drill Captain drilled us. It was a good drill.
 Wash come off of picket and .

August Tuesday, 16 1864
 We went out forrageing; 5 out of each Company. We was out 7 miles. We
 got plenty peaches and milk. When we come to camp our Regt was moved
 out of camp and on the cars to go to Holly Spring. We arrived hear at
 10 oclock.

August Wednesday, 17 1864
 We left Holly Spring at 6 and marched 9 miles. Then we camped at Waterford
 Station. We got here at 12. We had peaches and rice and potatoes and hard
 tack for dinner. Water ford.

August Thursday, 18 1864
 We left Waterford at 8 and arrived hear at 2 and camped 2 miles south of
 Tala at ABaville. Rained a little; roads miserable.

August Friday, 19 1864
 Part of our Brigade was started out and our Regiment had tore up. Orders
 come to stop until further orders. In about one hour orders come to camp
 We camped on the same ground. It rained all day. Roads v. bad.

August Saturday, 20 1864
 In camp all day till 5 in the evening. We left and marched 4 miles cross
 the Cane swamps and camped. We got to camp at 8 after night.

August Sunday, 21 1864
 We left camp at 7 and marched one mile. We were formed in line of battle
 and marched one mile until the rebs run and then we marched one mile and
 camped in the woods. We had corn cakes, pork.

August Monday, 22 1864
 We had corn cakes for breakfast. We marched within 3 miles of Oxford.
 Then we got the news that Forrest was in Memphis so we was ordered back.
 We marched across the Cane Creek and camped for the night. I went to kill
 a hog but did not find one.

August Tuesday, 23 1864
 Marched to the Talahachie River and the rebels come almost in our camp
 but they were soon driven back. They had 14 killed and 23 wounded and
 eleven prisoners. We had seven wounded and 1 killed. Lay in line all
 night. I was out forrageing today.

August Wednesday, 24 1864
 Reveille at 3. Our Company went on the shirmishing line at 9 oclock.
 Lay there all day. We had nothing to do. We drew 3 days rations. The
 weather fine.

August Thursday, 25 1864
 Come to Waterford station at 2 PM. Went in to camp west of town. We had

hog meat for supper. The weather nice and warm. I and Miller come on the rail track from the Talahachie.

August Friday, 26 1864
Left camp at 6 AM. Come to Hollow Springs at 3 PM. Miller and I went out to get something to eat. We got about 1 bushel of peaches and I killed 3 hogs. They were so very fat. One was a boar and so I killed two more on one shell.

August Saturday, 27 1864
Drew 4 days rations. went out forrageing. We had stewed apple, corn, and hog and also beef for supper. The weather hot. Some appearance of rain.

August Sunday, 28 1864
Leave Holly Springs at 7 A.M. Marching steadily all day. Arrived at Cold Water at 6 P.M. The country hilly. Plenty of fruit and pork. The weather warm.

August Monday, 29 1864
Reveille at 3 oclock. Started out at 6. Crossed Cold Water at 6½. Marching fast all forenoon. Come to Olive Branch at 2½. There we camped for the night marching 14 miles. The weather warm.

August Tuesday, 30 1864
Left camp at 5 oclock. Marched all day. Come to Memphis at 3 oclock and camped east of Memphis.

August Wednesday, 31 1864
The boys all come to camp, them that was wounded and sick and we drew some sow belly for 15 days. We drew 1 days ration. The weather fine.

September Thursday, 1 1864
In camp. We drew 5 days rations. Nothing to do. Meat, sugar, coffee, rice, beans. We draw light bread by the day. Nothing particular going on in camp.

September Friday, 2 1864
In camp. We marched a little today. Clayton, Wash, and I washed our thing. It is very warm today. Nothing very exciting in camp.

September Saturday, 3 1864
All quiet in camp. Wash was to town. The weather fine.

September Sunday, 4 1864
All quiet in camp but there is some talk of us leaving in the morning. I think we will leave Memphis for good this time. Weather fair.

September Monday, 5 1864
It rained like forty this morning. We got orders to be ready to leave at any hour. We left camp at 3 P.M. Marched to the river. Got on board the steamer L. N. Kennett. Lay at the landing all night.

September Tuesday, 6 1864
We got 4 months pay while on the Steamer L. M. Kennett. We got off of the boat 12:20 between Cairo and Mound City. The weather fair.

September Wednesday, 7 1864

We leave Memphis at 6 and 45 minutes, it for good so I think anyway.
passed the Steamer M. C. Forsyth at 8:20. Stopped to wood at 12:20.
Passed the Steamer Yankee at 6:30.

September Thursday, 8 1864

Passed the Steamer Memphis U.S. Mail Line at 6:30. Passed the Steamer
Brilliant at 7:30. Passed near Madrid at 2:45. Passed Island No. 10 at
4:15. Passed Hickman, Ky. at 7:15. Passed Columbus, Ky. at 9. Landed
at Cairo at one after night.

September Friday, 9 1864

In camp all day. Nothing particular happened. The darkies had meeting
west of our camp. The weather warm and dry.

September Monday, 12 1864

Every thing quiet in camp. No news from the north. The weather very warm.

September Tuesday, 13 1864

All quiet in camp. Had several fights in our Regiment in 6=G & C. No one
badly hurt. The weather very warm and dry.

September Wednesday, 14 1864

In camp till evening. Then we got on board of Steamer L. M. Kennett again.
Lay at Cairo all night on the boat. The weather fine.

September Thursday, 15 1864

Left Cairo this morning. Passed Steamer Olive Branch at 2:35 minutes.
Passed Steamer Benton 2:30 minutes. Passed Steamer Shuyles 2:45. Passed
the Steamer J. B. Ford at 3:50 P.M. Passed Steamer Albert Pearce at 4:40
Come to Commerce.

September Friday, 16 1864

Started at 8:30 going as far as Devil's Landing. There we got off and
marched 15 miles. Then we rested for the night.

September Saturday, 17 1864

Marched 4 miles. Then we got on board again at 4. Passed the Steamer
Ontario at 5:15 P.M. Got off at a town called Preston in Illinois at 6.
Lay there all night. The weather cool.

September Sunday, 18 1864

Left Preston at 9. Come to Muddy Creek ferry at 10:15, 4 miles from the
Mississippi River. Come to Evens Landing at 3:40. There we got on board
the Kennett. We marched about 10 miles all night.

September Monday, 19 1864
Left Marion at 5:30, passed the Steamer City Memphis & Hannibel all at 7:30. Passed Steamer Enterprise at 8:20. Passed the J. D. Perry at 8:30. Passed a town called St. Jeneva at 9. Come to Jefferson barracks at sunset. Went in camp.

September Tuesday, 20 1864
Lay in camp all day and nothing to do. We have hard tack to eat. The weather is fine. I was in the river swimming tonight.

September Wednesday, 21 1864
I was to town today. It was about $2\frac{1}{2}$ from here. Its name is Crondolet City. The weather fine. I and Noah Sheets was in a swimming. The water cool.

September Thursday, 22 1864
Noah Sheets and I crossed on the Steem ferry. To ill to hunt. We killed 2 squirrel. We had a good time. We got our dinner at a good Union man's house. The weather is fine.

September Friday, 23 1864
Drew some beef. We had onions and beans for dinner. The weather dry and windy. The river is very boiserous.

September Saturday, 24 1864
Moved camp $\frac{1}{2}$ mile further north on the Corondelet & St. Louis road. Drew cloathing. I drew one pair of bribs. The weather very fine.

September Sunday, 25 1864
In camp all day. No particular news from the east. We drew 5 days rations, coffee, sugar, salt, beans, rice. We drew 140 lbs. of flour and ond days rations of beans. The weather moderately cool.

September Monday, 26 1864
Orders to be ready to move at any moments warning. We did not leave till after night. The weather fair.

September Tuesday 27 1864
Left camp at 2 oclock this morning going to the depot. There we lay till day light. Then we got on board the cars and started for Mineral Point. Come to DeSoto Station at 9:15. Stayed there to get dinner. A little rain this morning.

September Wednesday, 28 1864
Still at DeSoto Station. The first Brigade was formed in line of battle yesterday evening. I saw Shelby Coal hung today. He killed one man and stab 4 more. He was hung on a read (red) oak tree. He was a reb.

September Thursday, 29 1864
Left DeSoto at 6:40. Come to Marrack River. There we got off. Lay there all day. Our Company was on picket. Distance to St. Louis 19 miles. Weather fine.

September Friday, 30 1864
Still on picket. Nothing particular going on in camp. We had potatoes for dinner and supper. The weather fair.

October Saturday, 1 1864
 Left Maremack River this morning at 6:30 minutes. Come to Jefferson Barracks at 7:15 min. Went to our old camp and packed our knapsacks and stored them. Orders were to leave at 11. The weather rain.

October Sunday, 2 1864
 Left Jefferson Barracks at 8:20 marching steadily till 3. Then we stopped to camp. We camped at a town called Kirkwood, 12 miles from St. Louis Pacific railroad.

October Monday, 3 1864
 Left Kirkwood at 8:30. Marched hard all day. Passed through Manchester at 9:15. Marched 3 miles further, then we passed through Balliver. That was at 2:15. We marched till 8:30 after night. Weather cool.

October Tuesday, 4 1864
 Left camp at 6:30. Come to Summit Station at 11, then we went in to camp. It rained nearly all afternoon.

October Wednesday, 5 1864
 In camp all day. Nothing particular going on in camp. The weather moderate cool.

October Thursday, 6 1864
 Still in camp and no particular going on. We had slapjacks for supper. The weather very pleasant.

October Friday, 7 1864
 The 122 was taken out of our Brigade and put in 2nd. We left Summit Station this evening, marched 12 miles. Camped at the Marremack River. The weather pleasant.

October Saturday, 8 1864
 Left camp at 7, marched 37. Camped at Bear Creek. The weather pleasant. The county very stony and hilly.

October Sunday, 9 1864
 We lay at Bear Creek all day till the militia come up. We bought some sow belly. Paid 25 cents a pound. Rather steep but we could do no better. The weather cool.

October Monday, 10 1864
 Left Bear Creek at 7. Marched 18 miles. Camped at Gascanade River. We waded the river. It was only crotch deep. Our Brigade was in front. Stony and hilly.

October Tuesday, 11 1864
 Left the Gascanade River at 8. Marched 25 miles. Passed a town called Lihn at 2 P.M., then being 8 miles from camp.

October Wednesday, 12 1864
 Left camp at 7, marched hard all day. Crossed the Osage River at 11. Marched within 3 miles of Jefferson City. There we camped for the night. The weather fair.

October Friday, 14 1864
 Left camp at 8. Marched 2 miles. Come to a town called California, a very nice town. It is on a nice prairie. I bought a coffee pot and 2

October, WEDNESDAY, 12, 1864.

Left Camp at 7, marched hard all day. Crossed the Gage River at 11. Marched with in 2 miles of Jefferson City. There my camp for the night. The weather fair.

THURSDAY, 13.

Left Camp at 8. Came to Jefferson City 10.30. Marched 1.3. miles to day. Camped at Skull Creek 7 miles from Jefferson City. Weather fair.

FRIDAY 14.

Left Camp at 8. Marched 2 miles. Came to a town called California a very nice town it is on a nice prairie. Bought a coffee pot and 2 chickens for 50 cents.

October, SATURDAY 15, 1864.

Left Camp 8.30. Marched. Marched 3.0 miles passed tifton at 2.30 P.M. Came to Lawrence at 6 P.M. Marched to the Lamine Creek and Camped. The weather.

SUNDAY, 16.

Left Lamine River at 7. We got on the cars passed. I know the first was Ottumwa. I Smith town we got off of the cars at Sedalia 14 miles from Lamine.

MONDAY, 17.

October Saturday, 15 1864
Left camp 8:30 (?). Marched 30 miles. Passed Tipton at 3:30 P.M. Come to Cyrecuse at 6 P.M.. Marched to the Lamine Creek and camped. Cool weather.

October Sunday, 16 1864
Left Lamine River at 7. We got on the cars. Passed two towns, the first was Otterville, 2 Smithtown. We got off of the cars at Sedalia, 14 miles from Lamine.

October Monday, 17 1864
In camp all day. The weather cool.

October Tuesday, 18 1864
I was in town today and bought ,e a pair of pants, 3 dollars, and a pair of overalls for 1 and a shirt, 2½. Then we went on picket. Cool weather.

October Wednesday, 19 1864
Left Sedalia at 8:15. Our regiment is in the rear of our Brigade. Marched 2 miles and stopped till after dinner. Passed through town George at 3. Marched 20 miles.

October Thursday, 20 1864
Left camp at 7. Marched 18 miles. Went into camp at 5 P.M. at Mud Creek. The county beautiful and level. The weather fair.

October Friday, 21 1864
Left camp at 7. Marched hard all day. Come to Lexiton at 5:30. Marched 23 miles. The country level, the weather cool. A little snow in the morning.

October Saturday, 22 1864
Left Lexington at 9 A.M. Marched 20 miles. Camped at Bear Creek. The country hilly. The weather fair. The rebs within 10 miles.

October Sunday, 23 1864
Left camp at 9. Marched 20 miles. Camped at Blue Creek. The first division marched in front. No fight yet. The country hilly. Orders to be O Red.

October Monday, 24 1864
Left camp at 12:30. Marched 18 miles. Camped at Big Blue. Went into camp at 9 A.M. The rebs are 20 miles from here. The Calvary hat quite a battle. Lost about 40. They left.

October Tuesday, 25 1864
Left camp at 9. Marched 15 miles. Camped at Blue Creek. We had plenty of hog meat. The weather fair; country hilly.

October Wednesday, 26 1864
Left camp 4:15. Marched 30 miles. Prarie country. All day to marching through. Nice land. Come to Harrisonville at 3:30. Camp within one mile of town.

- October Thursday, 27 1864
Camped all day near Harrisonville. Plenty to eat. We had 13 days rations taken from us. We forriaged to much.
- October Friday, 28 1864
In camp all day. Great excitement about going home to vote.
- October Saturday, 29 1864
In camp all day. Rations come to us today from Warrensburgh. The weather still fair.
- October Sunday, 30 1864
Left camp near Harrisonville at 8:30. Marched 12 miles. Camped near Pleasant Hills. The country level. The weather moderately cool.
- October Monday, 31 1864
Mustered for 2 months pay. Left camp 11:30. At Pleasant Hills. There we lay $\frac{1}{2}$ an hour and started for Lexington. Marched 22 miles. Camped. Our company went on picket.
- November Tuesday, 1 1864
Marched 20 miles. Come to Lexington at 6 in the evening. Camped there for the night. The country hilly. It rained some in the forenoon.
- November Wednesday, 2 1864
Left Lexington at 9 A.M. Marched 20 miles. Passed Dover at 7:15. Come to Waverly at 5:45. Camped here for the night. The nicest country ever I seen. Weather moderately cool.
- November Thursday, 3 1864
Left camp at 9:15. Marched 22 miles. It snowed nearly all day. Marching went hard. The snow was about 5 inches deep. The country beautiful. We had hog for supper. Passed through Fairview at 5:30.
- November Friday, 4 1864
Left camp at 9. Marched 19 miles. Come to the river 3 miles above Glassgow at 3:30. Come to Glassgow at 4:45. Camped there for the night. The weather cool. The country nice, nearly all prairie.
- November Saturday, 5 1864
Crossed the river at . Went into camp $\frac{1}{2}$ mile southeast of town. The news come to us that Dr. Porter, Major Henry, and Howard Ashly were killed by a lot of bushwhackers on the 1st of Nov. We had slabjacks for supper.
- November Sunday, 6 1864
In camp all day. Nothing particular going on. Everything quiet at this place. The weather nice. The country around here very hilly and broken. The town is nearly destroyed.
- November Monday, 7 1864
Left Glassgow at 9:30. Marched 12 miles. Come to Fayette 2:15. Went into camp 1 mile from town. The country hilly; the weather fair.
- November Tuesday, 8 1864
Today is election day. Hurrah for Abraham Lincoln. The regiment is casting a vote only temperaly just to see how it will go. The weather

rainy and cooler. Plenty of hog to eat.

November Wednesday, 9 1864
In camp all day near the town of Fayette. It rained and 'snowed the most part of the day. Nasty getting about. We went on picket in the evening.

November Thursday, 10 1864
Left camp at 9. Marched 5 miles. Come to Rocheport 3:30. Camped near the town on the bank of the Mo. The weather nice and the country hilly.

November Friday, 11 1864
Left camp at 10. We were the entire rear. Marched 15 miles. Camped at Columbia. The weather nice, the country hilly.

November Saturday, 12 1864
Left camp at 9. Marched 23 miles. Camped in the woods. We had 3 chickens for supper. The country nice and level. Some snow in the morning.

November Sunday, 13 1864
Left camp at 9:15. Marched 18 miles. Passed Williamsburgh 4:30. Come to camp at sunset. Country nice, weather moderately cool.

November Monday, 14 1864
Left camp at 9. Marched 20 miles. Passed threv Danville at 1. Come to high hill at 4. Camped there for the night. The country level, the weather fair.

November Tuesday, 15 1864
Left high hill at 9. Marched 17 miles. Camped near Warrenton. The country moderate level. The weather cool. Got into camp at 2:30.

November Wednesday, 16 1864
Left camp at 9. Marched 21 miles. We got into camp at 4. The country nice, the weather cool.

November Thursday, 17 1864
Left camp at 1. Marched 18 miles. Come to St. Charles at 4 P.M. Crossed the river at 7 on a ferry boat. Camped near the river. The weather nice.

November Friday, 18 1864
Drew rations this morning. Sugar, coffee, flour, salt. Left camp at 10. Marched 19. Come to St. Louis in the evening. The country nice. The weather fair.

November Saturday, 19 1864
In camp all day. Nothing particular going on. We got our knapsacks. Then we put on a clean suit of clothes. It make me feel good all over.

November Saturday, 26 1864
On the boat all day. The weather very windy. We could not travel on account of wind.

November Sunday, 27 1864
Come to Cairo at 2:30. Lay there till evening. Then started up the Ohio River. The weather moderatley fair.

November Monday, 28 1864
Come to Smith's Landing at 2:15. Got off of the boat $\frac{1}{2}$ mile from the town.

Lay there all night. The weather nice.

November Tuesday, 29 1864
Left Smithland at day light. Smithland is at the mouth of the Cumberland River. The weather is nice. The land along the river is not much cultivated.

November Wednesday, 30 1864
We arrived here at Nashville at about ;2 oclock after night. Lay on the boats all night. The weather cool.

December Thursday, 1 1864
This morning our Company was detailed to unload the boats. When we got every thing off of the boats we went to camp about 3 miles from town. The weather warm.

December Friday, 2 1864
We lay in line of battle all day but no rebs come. Old Hood is a coming.

December Saturday, 3 1864
Moved our line up on the hill. Lay there all day. The weather cool.

December Sunday, 4 1864
Still in line. We threw up breast works all night and got ready for the rebs but they did not come in yet. The weather rainy.

December Monday, 5 1864
We worked in the breast works again. Today we gots them done. All ready for an attack but we have not had none yet.

December Tuesday, 6 1864
Yet in line and no rebs yet but shelling all the time from our lines and no reply.

December Wednesday, 7 1864
Still in line and shelling the rebs like everything. We went on picket today and I got several cracks at the rebs. It is cool.

December Thursday, 8 1864
I got a bucket of salted pickles today and sour vinegar and we had pickles for dinner. The rebs are close yet and a shooting all the time at some of us. We are relieved from picket.

December Friday, 9 1864
The weather very cold. Nothing very particular going on. The rebs still has there same position.

December Saturday, 10 1864
In camp all day. The weather most awful cold. All quiet in front. No news from east.

December Sunday, 11 1864
The weather cold. A person most freeze to death. It is so cold. This is a good time on soldiers No Yes

December Monday, 12 1864
In camp all day. The weather cold and we are scarce of wood but hurrah for Abb.

December Tuesday, 13 1864
In camp, on the same line yet. The cavalry are a going out today to rout the Jonies. It is getting warmer again.

December Wednesday, 14 1864
In camp all day and nothing of any importance. It rained last night and this morning. It is awful muddy. Little fighting on the picket lines last night.

December Thursday, 15 1864
This morning we left our works and moved on the rebs. We had a big fight but nearly all with artillery. Captured a lot of rebs. The first division did they charged their works.

December Friday, 16 1864
This morning we again marched in line of battle towards the rebs and at about 2 oclock we charged their works and captured a lot of artillery and some prisoners and arms. Camped in line. Rainy.

December Saturday, 17 1864
This morning we marched out on the Granny White Pike after the rebels and camped about 12 miles from Nashville. We could hear cannonading in the night.

December Sunday, 18 1864
Left camp at 7 oclock. Marched 8 miles and then camped and in about 2 minutes we had orders to pack up and then we marched 2 miles on the other side of town. Cavalry captured 15 artillery. Rain. Muddy.

December Monday, 19 1864
Left camp at 10. Marched to Springhill. Raining all day. The weather cold. The rebs took 4 pieces of artillery. The Calvary are still driving them.

December Tuesday, 20 1864
Our Company on picket. I baked bread most all night last night. Today we killed a hap (?) and we had a great time. We left camp at 4 and marched 2 miles and camped. Raining all night and snow too.

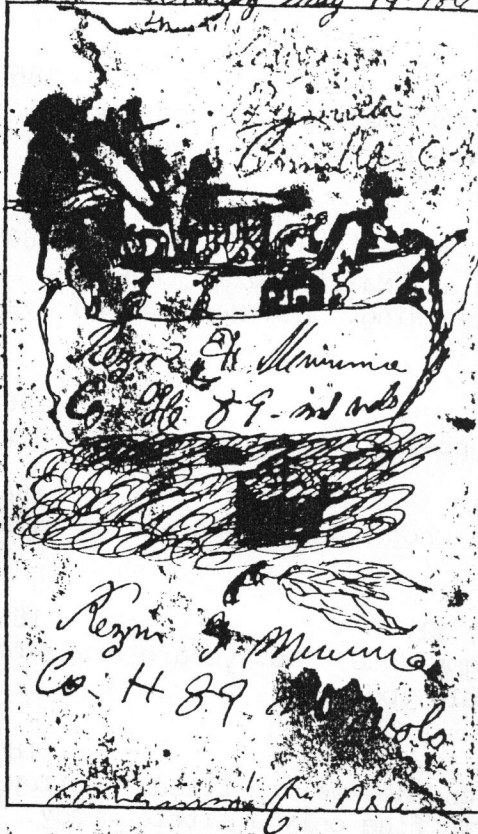
December Wednesday, 21 1864
In camp all day. It is awful weather. It rains and snows all the time and it is so muddy that a person cant hardly get about.

December Thursday, 22 1864
In camp till about three oclock and then we marched about 4 miles and camped near Duck ? River. The weather cold. it if freeze up tite today.

December Friday, 23 1864
In camp all day. Nothing going on of any particular fighting in the front. I shot a squirrel and we had it for dinner. The weather cool. Orders to be ready to march till 3 oclock in the morning.

December Saturday, 24 1864
Had Reveille at 2 oclock this morning. Left camp at three. Passed threw town today. Break Columbia. We marched 8 m. and camped. Clayton Mallonee and myself went a foraging. Got 3 chickens, one sholder of meat for Christmas.

NEW YEAR January First, 1865. Left camp at 7 oclock marching 15 miles and camped with in 1 mile of Waynesborough. The country very hilly, plenty of water.

January Monday, 2 1865

Left camp at 8 oclock. Passed through Waynesborough at 10. Marching 16 miles and camped at Clifton. The country hilly. The weather fair. Our Division in front.

January Tuesday, 3 1865

Left camp at 11 oclock marching to the landing and go on board of the Steamer Huntsman. Went up the Tenn. as far as to Point Pleasant landing. there at 7. The weather fair.

January Wednesday 4 1865

Lay at Pleasant Point all day. Nothing particular going on. The weather still fair. We had molasses for supper.

January Thursday, 5 1865

Still on the boat going up the river slowly. No particular news. The weather moderately cool.

January Friday, 6 1865
On the boat all day. We lay on the Alabama side at East Port. The weather cool. A little snow.

January Saturday, 7 1865
Got off of the boat at East Port and marched about 1 mile and camped. They say it is a going to be winter quarters maybe and I have a stove in our tent. Bully times.

January Sunday, 8 1865
Moved camp today and now Wash and Clayton and Maple and me is in one shebang. We have a stove and it is a nice thing. Now Maple and I are in one mess just since this morning.

January Monday, 9 1865
In camp all day. We had sad cakes for supper. The weather cold and rough.

January Tuesday, 10 1865
Working on the breastworks all day hard. Chopin went hard and it rained the most part of the day.

January Wednesday, 11 1865
Working on the works today again and we got done. Now we are ready for all the rebs in the south. The weather is cold today.

January Thursday, 12 1865
Today we raised our tent and made bunks and now we are fixed. Bulley for the balance of the winter. The weather is fine only a little muddy.

January Friday 13 1865
In camp all day and nothing particular going on mentioning of. The weather is fine, a little muddy on top.

January Saturday, 14 1865
I was detailed out to forage. Well, we went out 7 miles. I got 2 chicken and a mess of beans and a knife and 2 porks. Kline was a going to make a fuss about one chicken. The weather fair.

January Sunday, 15 1865
In camp all day and nothing particular going on. The weather fair.

January Monday, 16 1865
On inspection today, regimental, and so forth if it is bass awkward. The weather fair. Dress parade every evening.

January Tuesday 17 1865
this morning I and Maple went in to the woods to cut poles to fix our bed up and pine brush. We have a soft bed. Inspection. Dress parade. Weather fine.

January Wednesday, 18 1865
Left camp at 8, marched to the landing. Got on board Caroline. Arrived at Clifton this evening. Our business was to load the 23 Corp wagon train on the boats, they being turned over to A. J. Smith. Weather fair.

January Thursday, 19 1865
Commencing to load the wagons at 1 P.M. Each Company had to load wagons according to the amount of men. The weather cloudy.

January Friday, 20 1865
Today I and Eley went a hunting in the forenoon. I killed 3 squirrel and 2 quails. In the afternoon we gathered about one half a bushel of hickernuts. The weather fair.

January Saturday, 21 1865
I and Maple went a hunting. We killed nothing. We got the red 2 peck of nuts. It rained all day. At 5 o'clock I was detailed for guard around the mule carell.

January Sunday, 22 1865
It is still a drizzling. I was a shooting mark all day. Our Company was detailed to load mules.

January Monday, 23 1865
In camp all day. The boats started for East Port. There is snow on the ground. I was relieved from guard.

January Tuesday, 24 1865
Our Company loaded 27 wagons on the boat in the afternoon. It is cool and froze up.

January Wednesday, 25 1865
I and Ealey went a hunting. I shot 4 birds, woodcocks, and we had them for supper. We cooked hominy in the forenoon.

January Thursday, 26 1865
William Mallonee and I went out to get some. When we got to the mouth of and crossed, we saw a barrel and we took it out and it was a barrel of flour. Cold.

January Friday, 27 1865
Ealy and me went out a hunting. We killed 6 fowls. We had them for supper. The weather is cold and frozen up.

January Saturday, 28 1865
Loading on oats nearly all day. The weather cold.

January Sunday, 29 1865
Left camp at Clifton at 7. Got on board the Superior and off for East Port. Got there at 12 o'clock at night. The weather cool.

January Monday, 30 1865
Got off of the boat and went to camp. Nothing particular going on. Only we got the news that the Colonel was pilerved up as he was on his way home.

January Tuesday, 31 1865
I was in camp all day and nothing to do yet. Well the weather is cold and not much snow.

February Wednesday, 1 1865
I went on picket this morning and it looks like rain.

February Thursday, 2 1865
Got off of picket this morning. It rained last night but I kept dry all night.

February Friday, 3 1865
In camp all day and nothing particular going on. I made a ring today. The weather cool and looks like falling weather.

February Saturday, 4 1865
On guard this morning at the river over some mules in a pen one mile from the river. It looks like rain.

February Sunday 5 1865
It rained last night and this morning it snowed. I was relieved at 1 oclock. Mud up to a mans ass if he lyes down.

February Monday, 6 1865
News that 16 Corps to leave. Some of the 3rd Div. is going on the boats now and in a few days we will go too. The weather is cold like.

February Tuesday, 7 1865
In camp all day and eating hickernuts. We have plenty of them. We gathered them at Clifton in the woods. Snow. Very cold.

February Wednesday, 8 1865
On guard all day. It is midling cold but the snow is about all gone. Orders to leave at 6 oclock in the morning.

February Thursday, 9 1865
We had reveille at 4 and started to the boats at 6 and one half hour. Left East Port at 10 oclock. The weather fair.

February Friday, 10 1865
Come to Paducah at 7. Lay there one hour. Left there. Passed down the Ohio. Come to Cairo at 3. Lay there all night. The weather fair.

February Saturday, 11 1865
I was a running around in Cairo the most part of the day. Nothing particular going on. A little fuss with a silversmith on fixing a watch.

February Sunday, 12 1865
Left Cairo at 8. Passed Columbus at 12. Passed Hickman at half past 12. Then we run on till night and tied up till morning. The weather cool. Three men drowned.

February Monday, 13 1865
Started up at 6 oclock. Run all day till 6. Then we come to old Memphis at 6. Lay there all night. Raining all the day. Cold.

February Tuesday, 14 1865
Started out before day. Run all day. Come to White River at 6. Lay there till 11 and then started up again. Cold like.

February Wednesday, 15 1865
Running all day. Come to Vicksburgh at 5. Got off of the boat. Lay at the landing all night. The weather fair.

February Thursday, 16 1865
Orders to move to camp. We moved out 4 miles and camped. I was on fatigue all day. The weather nice and cool.

February Friday, 17 1865
In camp and had a good mess of potatoes. We drew 5 days of rations: meat, crackers, coffee, sugar, beans, salt. That is all. The weather is very nice and warm. I washed.

February Saturday 18 1865
We drew clothing today. I drew one haversack and a canteen and I traded watches. Paid 2 dollars to boot. The weather is very fine and lovely.

February Sunday, 19 1865
Orders to leave today. Left camp at 1 marching to the boats 4 miles and lay at the landing until 5 oclock. Then we got on. The weather fair.

February Monday, 20 1865
Left Vicksburgh at 4 oclock. Run until 2 oclock. Passed Natchez. Come to the mouth of East River at 7. Run on that night until we come to Baton Rouge. Lay there until 4 in the morning, starting up, run all day.

February Tuesday, 21 1865
Traveling all day between Baton Rouge and Orleans. Come to Orleans at 5. I was sick all afternoon. I was on fatigue. The regiment went into camp. It rained awful hard.

February Wednesday, 22 1865
I come to camp this morning. I could hardly make it. I was middling sick. Got medicine from the doctor. Raining by spells all day.

February Thursday, 23 1865
I went to the Division hospital today. Sick. Rained all night. I lay in water all night; not very good; got my health.

February Friday, 24 1865
I feel some better this morning. The doctor said I had the small pox; moved me in another tent. Lay there all day. Feel good enough. Rainy and muddy.

February Saturday, 25 1865
This morning I am broke out but feel pretty well. Clayton was here today. The weather fair.

February Sunday, 26 1865
This morning I went to the barracks U.S. general small pox hospital. I feel well enough. Went to bed. The weather fair.

February Monday, 27 1865
Take medicine. I feel tolerably well. One man died last night. The weather is wet and raining a little.

February Tuesday, 28 1865
This morning the doctor said it looked like if I was going to to die. I feel well. Get poor grub. The weather fair.

March Wednesday, 1 1865
Get out of bed today for the first time. I feel bulley. I dont take any medicine any more. The weather is fair.

March Thursday, 2 1865
In Ward 14 yet. Get not much to eat. I feel well enough to go to the Company. The weather fair.

March Friday, 3 1865
I was sent down stairs today in Ward 13. It is a very nice place down here. I have a good bed. The weather fair.

March Saturday, 4 1865
In Ward 13 yet and no better grub yet. I am tiard of staying here. It is very lonesome here. I will try to get away. The weather fair.

March Sunday, 5 1865
In the hospital Ward 13 and turned to duty. I feel good on the subject. The weather fair. Drew my suit. Ready to go to the regiment in the morning.

March Monday, 6 1865
Left this morning. Come to regiment at noon and got right on board the Steamer Col. Colburn and shoved out at one oclock. The weather fair.

March Tuesday, 7 1865
We lay all day at the U.S. telegraph station 5 miles from the Gulf. The weather fair. A something the matter with my heart.

March Wednesday, 8 1865
Got off of the Steamer Col. Colburn. On the (Steamer) Fairchild and rode in the gulf to a ship called Guidemaster. Got on board of it and was off in an hour for Fort Gains. Rode all day and night. The weather fair.

March Thursday, 9 1865
Still on the ship a going. We arrived at Fort Gaines at 2 oclock. Got off of the ship on a steamer and went to shore. Went right out in to camp 3 miles. Weather raining.

March Friday, 10 1865
We moved camp at noon in a nice fine woods. I saw Simon Barkly. He was hearty. The weather is fine. I and I Simon Barkley stayed all night with us.

March Saturday, 11 1865
Wash and I went along with Simon to their regiment. Took dinner and went to see Fort Gains. The best Fort I ever saw. We had a mess of fresh oysters for supper. The weather fair.

March Sunday, 12 1865
In camp all day. David and Plucher and Simon Barkley was here for dinner. Church in the after noon. Inspection in the fore noon. The weather fair. Shelling towards Mobile occasionally.

March Monday, 18 1865
I camp all quiet. I was on fatigue. Drew 2 days rations. Played a game of ball. The weather fair.

March Tuesday, 14 1865
 Played a game of ball in the fore noon. It is a raining like everything.
 Orders to drill 3 hours a day. 1 in the fore noon; 2 in the afternoon.

March Wednesday, 15 1865
 In camp all day and playing ball in the fore noon. Lots of fun. Simon
 Barkley was up here. Ate dinner with me.

March Thursday, 16 1865
 Drill in the fore noon and playing ball the balance of the day. The
 weather is fair. Orders to keep 3 days cooked rations.

March Friday, 17 1865
 In camp all day. Drill in the fore noon. Playing ball in the afternoon
 and Wash and I Wash The weather here is fair. Meeting at 3 and
 also tonight.

March Saturday, 18 1865
 Drill in fore noon. Play ball the balance of the day. The 47th left
 today. We drew 3 days rations. That is a sign of leaving. The weather
 is fair.

March Sunday, 19 1865
 Orders to be ready to leave at any early hour this morning. Left camp at
 10. got on board the Tarascon 7 P.M. Went to Fort Morgan.

March Monday, 20 1865
 Started for Mobile at 9 oclock. The Bay midling rough. Went up Fish
 Creek 15 miles. Got off of the boat at 6 P.M. Went in camp 2 miles
 from the creek. The weather warm.

March Tuesday, 21 1865
 In camp all day until 3 P.M. I was detailed for fatigue to work on the
 Pontoon Brice across the Fish River. The weather wet.

March Wednesday, 22 1865
 Arranged camp today. Play ball some. Dress parade. The weather fair.

March Thursday, 23 1865
 On fatigue today. All day working on the breast works. It was very hot.
 Dress parade. A little fighting this morning. Captured 34 rebs. Wounded
 4 of them.

March Friday, 24 1865
 In camp all day. Meeting at 1 and at night. I and Ealy went a fishing.
 Orders to leave in the morning. The weather fair.

March Saturday, 25 1865

 We was relieved from picket at 8. Went to camp. Heavy fireing at Ft. Spannish in the afternoon. The weather cloudy. Drew i days ration.

March Wednesday, 29 1865
 On fatigue all day building breast works. Still a shooting at the Fort. Our men are with in three hundred yards. Rain nearly all day. The balance of our teams come today.

March Thursday, 30 1865
 Working on the works again today. The weather fair. Prayer meeting tonight.

March Friday, 31 1865
 Our Company on picket today. Cannonadeing all day. Awful heavy at sun-down. The weather fair.

April Saturday, 1 1865
 dar arst dog of gril shicked me de nare he ve me vild Got relieved off of picket at 8. George Kline come to see us today. It was old George as ever. The weather fair.

April Sunday, 2 1865
 Orders to be ready to serve at any moment. George Kline come over today again. Church at 10 and at night. Drew beef today. I got some medicine for the diarrhea. The weather fine.

April Monday, 3 1865
 This morning we got orders to be ready to move at any moment. Left camp at 12. Moved out 6 miles. Formed in line of war around Blakely F.O. Lay there all night. The weather fair.

April Tuesday, 4 1865
 Commenced to rain a little this morning. Skirmishing briskly Co. C. & F All quiet in camp. There was 4 Co. out of our regt. for skirmishing. Our Co for one. Lots of shooting. The weather fair.

April Wednesday, 5 1865
 Still out on line and lots of shooting. One man killed out of Co. E. Vance Wormick. We got relieved at about 8 oclock tonight. Orders to move camp in the morning. Weather fair.

April Thursday, 6 1865
 Left camp at 2 oclock. Moved 1 mile further to the left of our line. Skirmishing all the time and shelling. We will work on the breast works. Nothing particular going on. The weather fair.

April Friday, 7 1865
 In camp until 4 oclock. Then we went on picket. We had dried fruit for dinner and pickels, coffee, and meat and crackers, sugar. The weather rainy. I am not very well at the present.

April Saturday, 8 1865
This morning we went out on the skirmishing line at 4 A.M. and there we stayed all day. Plenty of shooting. I shot about 8 rounds at the Jonnies. They could not shoot much. We kept them down pretty well. A little rain today. Near Ft. Girard. Ft. Spanish gave up this fight.

April Sunday, 9 1865
In camp till about 5 oclock P.M. We was ordered to fall in. Marched down to our skirmishers formed in line and charged the rebel works. Captured a lot of prisoners and artillery, 20 pieces. After all was over Co. went on picket. 23, h. & 23. P. 22 ifficers & 2 Major general

April Monday, 10 1865
We was relieved at 10 oclock A.M. Went to camp. Had biscuits for dinner and corn cakes for supper. We captured about 25 hundred prisoners. That is our Division. There was only one man killed in our Regt. Co. H. The weather fine.

April Tuesday, 11 1865
I was on detail this morning at a 100 Br to get it out of the swamp on to a bullwagon. Got done by noon. Still a firing. The weather hot.

April Wednesday, 12 1865
In camp all day. Lots of war news. Great excitements. Meeting at 1 oclock and at night. The weather is fair.

April Thursday, 13 1865
We got orders to be ready to move at 10 oclock. We left camp at 12A.M. Marched 8 miles and camped. I was detailed for picket. The country rolling and piney. The weather fair.

April Friday, 14 1865
Reveille at day break. Left camp at 7 A.M. Marched 15 miles and camped. Country level and piney. Plenty of water. The weather tolerably hot.

April Tuesday, 18 1865
Left camp at 11 oclock A. M. We guarded the supply train. We marched 10 miles and camped at half past five P.M. The country looking settled midling well. The weather fair.

April Wednesday, 19 1865
 Left camp at 9 A.M. Marched 15 miles and camped at 5 P.M. Hilly country.
 We got the news of the surrender of Gen Forest and Lee and Johnson. The
 weather fair.

April Thursday, 20 1865
 Left camp at 6 A.M. Marched slowly all the time. Come to a creek called
 (Sullivans). There we lay 2 hours until the pontoon was fixed. Then we
 marched on. Camped at 6 P.M. Marched 16 miles. Hilly country.

April Friday, 21 1865
 Left camp at 10 A.M. We guarded the supply train. Marched 6 miles and
 camped at 5 P.M. Rained all day. We are within 6 miles of Greenville.

 Plenty of cornbread to eat. Wash said I had the pappilation or some thing
 of that kind.

April Saturday, 29 1865
 We was relieved off of picket at 9 A.M. I stood 2 hours duty. Come to
 camp. Nothing particular going on in camp. The weather fair. Prayer
 meeting at 7 P.M.

April Sunday, 30 1865
Mustard for pay today. The boats come up the river today. Now we will get plenty of rations again. The weather fair. Church at 7 P.M.

May Monday, 1 1865
Skirmished. Camp today and drew 5 days ration. Meat and coffee, sugar, hard bread, beans. The weather fair.

May Tuesday, 2 1865
I done some washing today and when I got done I was detailed for fatigue in the afternoon. When I was relieved I helped to dig a well. Dug it about 10 feet. Got dark. We stayed for the night.

May Wednesday, 3 1865
This morning we finished the well. Dug it about 12 feet. Plenty water. Good water. In camp the balance of the day. The weather fair and pleasant.

May Thursday, 4 1865
I helped to erect a shade over our meeting ground. Meeting at 6 tonight. We had a good meeting. The weather nice and pleasant.

May Friday, 5 1865
In camp all day. Nothing particular going on in camp. We drew rations. I washed. Wash and myself fixed a bunk in our tent. Church tonight. Weather fair.

May Saturday, 6 1865
Church at 10 and 2 and at night. One joined the church. The weather fair. Plenty to eat. Nothing special going on in camp.

May Sunday, 7 1865
On picket all day. It looks like rain. All quiet on the picket line. Church at 9 and 10 and 3 and at night. I got all the mulberries I could eat a most.

May Monday, 8 1865
It rained last night a fine shower. We was relieved at 9 A.M. Lots of mulberries to eat this morning after we come to camp. Lamon and Len Johnson went a hunting. Killed one rabbit. The weather fair.

May Tuesday, 9 1865
Ealy and myself went a hunting. We killed 2 rabbits and 2 squirrel. The rabbits are plenty around here. We had biscuits and potatoes for supper. The weather fair until night. Then we had a fine shower.

May Wednesday, 10 1865
The 1st Division left today. We had rabbit for dinner and slabjacks. Dress parade. Orders read about the surrender of all the troops on the east side of the Mississippi. The weather fair.

May Thursday, 11 1865
In camp all day. Nothing particular going on. Plenty to eat these days. The weather showery. All through today Confederate soldiers coming in all the time from Johnson and .

May Friday, 12 1865
On picket all day and there are plenty rebels coming in all the time. The

weather fair in the day time and cool nights. Little to cool for to make comfortable sleeping.

May Saturday, 13 1865
One year from today them potatoes Wisner. (written across the top.) We were relieved this morning at 9 A.M. Went to camp and at 3 P.M. we had Regimental inspection. The weather fair. We had dew-berries for dinner. Today no particular news in camp.

May Sunday, 14 1865
We had Company inspection at half past 8 oclock A.M. Church at 9 A.M. Church at 7 P.M. Dress parade at 6 and one half P.M. There are no special news in camp today. The weather very comfortable.

May Monday, 15 1865
Ealy and myself was out a hunting all day and killed 1 rabbit and we missed Dress Parade and now we are candidates for extra duty. The weather fair. No particular news in camp.

May Tuesday, 16 1865
The first thing I done was my extra duty and then drill one hour and then we had blackberry pie for dinner and then we had supper and the Dress Parade at 6 and then church at half past dark. The weather fair.

May Wednesday, 17 1865
Company drill in the morning. Dress Parade t 6 P.M.. Meeting at dark. There are news come tonight that Jefferson was captured with all the hosts. The weather fair.

May Thursday, 18 1865
Ealy and my self was out a hunting in the afternoon but got nothing. Dress Parade at 6 P.M. and church at night.

May Friday, 19 1865
I went on picket this morning. Got all the mulberries I could eat. There is nothing of any importance going on. The weather fair.

May Saturday, 20 1865
We was relieved this morning at the usual hour. Come to camp. All quiet. Drew 5 days of rations. We had no dress parade tonight. The weather fair. Church tonight. Away truly, Rizen

May Sunday, 21 1865
There was church at . Reverend J. C. Martz preached prayer meeting at two oclock. Preaching at night. Prey too. Sacrament. Nothing special going on in camp. The weather warm.

May Monday, 22 1865
I was out a berry hunting. I got 1 gallon and a half and then went to camp. We have plenty to eat. There is no particular news in camp today. The weather fair.

May Tuesday, 23 1865
I was on Battalion drill today for the first time in 1865. Major Winters drill after drill. I and Ealy went a hunting and come back with fishermans luck. Weather fair.

May Wednesday, 24 1865
Drill this morning. I was on fatigue today. The weather fair. Dress Parade every evening.

May Thursday, 25 1865
No drill today. We drew rations and 8 we drew 6 days. Shoulder and pickled pork, coffee, sugar, hard bread. The weather fair.

May Friday, 26 1865
Drill this morning. Captain Meetcker Drill. Pretty good drill. It rained last night. The weather fair tonight.

May Saturday, 27 1865
In camp all day. Nothing particular going on in camp. Dress Parade. Yes, I forgot, I was out a hunting plumbs. They are ripe now. The weather fair.

May Sunday, 28 1865
On Brigade review at 8 A.M. The weather warm and dry. Nothing special going on in camp. Preaching at 11 and at night. The weather fair.

May Monday 29 1865
In camp all day. Nothing new. The weather thundering and looks like storm rain. R. F. Mumma 1865

May Tuesday, 30 1865
Division review today. It was very dusty. Come in after all was over. Remained in camp the balance of the day. The weather hot and Dress Parade every evening 6 P.M.

May Wednesday, 31 1865
We had Grand Review by General A. J. Smith. Got orders to leave in the morning. The weather is hot.

June Thursday, 1 1865
Left Montgomery this morning. March 15 miles and got in camp at 3 oclock P.M.. The country level.

June Friday, 2 1865
Had reveille at 3. Left camp at 5. Marched 18 ? miles. Camped on Ash Creek. I got in at 5 P.M. The weather fair.

June Saturday, 3 1865
Left camp at 5. Marched 19 miles. Camped 3 miles west of Pleasant Hill. I got to camp at 6 P.M. The weather hase.

June Sunday 4 1865
Left camp at 5 marched 9 miles. Passed through Warrenton at 11 A.M. Marched 7 miles further. Camped on the river. One boat ready for some of us. The weather fair.

June Monday, 5 1865
W. H. Osborn left this morning with 2 Regt on the trains. I was relieved this morning of guard. Ealy and myself went a hunting, killed one squirrel. The weather fair if you call hat fair.

June Tuesday, 6 1865
 Still lay here in camp. Nothing special going on. Twice in a swimming.
 No boat come for us yet. The weather hot and sultry. Plenty berries to eat.

June Wednesday, 7 1865
 Clayton, Wisner, Smith, Martz and myself went out a hunting. Wisner
 killed 3 squirrel and I 2 and the rest none. The weather fair and hot.
 W. P. Heolett landing.

June Thursday, 8 1865
 Got on board the at 2 P.M. and started down the
 Stopped twice for wood.

June Friday, 9 1865
 Run all last night. Stopped for wood twice. Arrived at Mobile at three
 P.M. Moved outside of town and camped. Jacob Snyder come to see us. The
 weather fair but hot.

June Saturday, 10 1865
 Rained. Camped this morning. Orders, plenty of news but none for us.
 The weather fair.

June Sunday, 11 1865
 Inspection at 8 and a half oclock. After that preaching and preaching at
 sun down. The weather a little rainy. Nothing of any importance going on.

June Monday, 12 1865

June Wednesday, 14 1865
 Still on guard every 6 hours. Lots of rain today. I got as wet as a cat.
 From 12 oclock till 2 it rained the most of the time.

June Thursday, 15 1865
 Still on guard. I was on from 6 till 8 and from 2 till 4 and then I went
 to camp to get my clothing. Drawers, 2 pair pants, 1 stocks, 1 rubber, one

June Friday, 16 1865
 Still how are you prison on last night from 10 till 1 and this morning from
 6 till 8 and so on. Drew rations 5 days, 2 of flour, 3 of hard tack, meat,

June Saturday, 17 1865
 On guard every 6 hours. The weather hot and sultry. Last night Smith,

Still at the prison. Wash and Lamson come to see us. The time passes away fast. I got a letter from mamma and sister. We had a mess of sea crabs. McClod katched them. It rained a good shower after supper.

June Monday, 19 1865
Still at the prison but not so much duty to do. We only go on every 3 day now. We drew pay. 64 dollars. The weather hot.

June Tuesday, 20 1865
I am on guard today. Every 4 hours. We had fish for dinner, just so much as we wanted. Drew rations today. I went to town to get my watch fixed. He said tomorrow. The weather fair.

June Wednesday, 21 1865
Went to town to get my watch. It was not done. You can have it tomorrow. I can have it now. Give me my watch. Run over town. Got apples and melons to eat. The weather hot and hotter.

June Thursday, 22 1865
All quiet at the prison this morning. I went to town and left my watch again. The weather hot and I went to town tonight again to see around.

June Friday, 23 1865
Went on guard at 8 A.M. Relieved at 10 A.M. We had potatoes and beans for dinner. In the afternoon I went to town for my watch. Did not get it. The weather fair.

June Saturday, 24 1865
All quiet at the prison. I went to town in the afternoon to get my watch. I got it and then Clayton and myself went to the market and got a good supper for \$1 dollar. It rained a fine shower.

June Sunday, 25 1865
At the prison all day. Nothing particular going on today. Isac hired a cook. The weather hot until about 5 oclock P.M. Then we got a fine shower of rain. It lasted 1 hour; it was a very hard rain.

June Monday, 26 1865
We drew rations 5 days and went to camp to stay. Every thing quiet. The weather fine.

June Tuesday, 27 1865
Wash and myself went to town. Took a car ride. We went after our watches. It was not done. Come back. All quiet in camp. Weather hot. R. F. Mumma

June Wednesday, 28 1865
All quiet in camp this morning until about 12 oclock. Then comes another detail and so we went. Now we are in town a going near the prison where we was before. The weather rainy.

June Thursday, 29 1865
On guard at the transportation office. Very nice place. The weather fair. A little too hot for comfortably.

June Friday, 30 1865
I was relieved this morning at 5 A.M. I went to town to get my watch. It

was not done but he loaned me one until he get mine fixed. The weather windy. I got a big fish for 25.

July Saturday, 1 1865
All quiet in our house this morning. I went to town but got nothing. It rained from 12 until 3. All quiet. Heavy thunder.

July Sunday, 2 1865
All quiet here. I went down to see Wash. The weather fair. I stood one hour of guard today.

July Monday, 3 1865
On guard today at the transportation office. Every thing going off about right. Nothing of any importance going on today. The weather hot.

July Tuesday, 4 1865
Great excitement in town today. Negroes and citizens are a fighting. One negger got killed. George Stephens and myself had a great oyster soup for the fourth. The weather hot.

July Wednesday, 5 1865
I went down after my watch but it was not done. The balance of the day I and George Stephens went a sea-crabing. We caught 6. Had a great mess. The weather fair, thunders a little. Good night. Jonah Cline come to regiment.

July Thursday, 6 1865
This morning finds me in good health and detailed for guard. It went off all smooth day. No excitements today at all. The weather hot. We had fish dinner supper.

July Friday, 7 1865
I was relieved off of guard this morning. Not much news about getting mustered out. I was to camp in the afternoon. All quiet. The weather hot. Drew beef today.

July Saturday, 8 1865
Some news today. We will be mustered out in 6 days. That is all. I was not very well in the afternoon. I had a chilling fever and headache most The weather hot.

July Sunday, 9 1865
My birthday today and I am on guard at Post No. 2. I had another chill. I went to the Methodist church at night. Herd a good sermon. There was a big fire in town. The weather fair.

July Monday, 10 1865
Drew 5 days rations. I was relieved this morning at half past 7 oclock of guard. I had a good spell fo ague. It lasted from 10 A.M. till 3 P.M. I took three charges of medicine. I felt quite well. Quiet night. The weather fair.

July Tuesday, 11 1865
I felt tolerably well this morning. Got some more medicine and took it before the time for chill and so I had no chill today. Good for that. The weather a little rainy here today. All quiet.

July Wednesday, 12 1865
I went to camp today. They were making out the Muster Out Roll as fast as they could. I ate my supper with Kline, Long, Smith, John. It rained a hard shower today.

July Thursday, 13 1865
On guard this morning. I stood two tricks and one half and I got sick and was relieved; The weather fair. A little too hot.

July Friday, 14 1865
This morning I felt pretty well. I done a little washing. We was relieved today. The 119 Ill, 21 Mo., went to camp and it made me tyerd I tell you. The weather fair.

July Saturday, 15 1865
Drew rations today. I went to town to straiten up a coat account maid it all right. We had rost-snears(roasting ears) for dinner. The weather fair.

July Sunday, 16 1865
The Chaplain preached in the Regt today. We had 3 messes of corn green. We had Dress Parade for the last time I think. The Col. made a speech to us. It rained.

July Monday, 17 1865
We had corn for breakfast and tomatoes for dinner. It rained all fore noon. Our Muster Out Papers are all ready for inspection. Get mustered out tomorrow at 9 A.M. That is the talk. The weather fair.

July Tuesday, 18 1865
We had a mess of rostsnears for breakfast. We are not mustered out yet. They say tomorrow. All quiet in camp. The recruits left today. I hated to see them go but it had to go. The weather fair.

July Wednesday, 19 1865
We had rostsnears for breakfast and dinner. At 2 oclock our Co. was mustered out of the U.S. service. Bulley for that. The weather fair.

July Thursday, 20 1865
We got orders to be ready to move at 1P.M. We left camp at 2 P.M. Marched to the Steemer Brown, got on, shoved out at 6 P.M. for New? Run all night. The water ruff.

July Friday, 21 1865
Got on the lake at about 12 A.M. Then we had 6 hours running. Every thing went off quiet. Run till 5 P.M. Then we got off and took the cars and run the balance of the way to New. There we lay all night.

July Saturday, 22 1865
Still on the landing. Good prospects for getting off today. Got a boat called Argonot. Got on board at 12. Fooled around all afternoon coaling and puting on wood. Started for Cairo at 8 P.M. Run all night. The weather fair. Country level and wealthy.

July Sunday, 23 1865
This morning going up the river as fast as time can carry us. Passed Fort at 9 A.M. Come to BattonRouge at 3:40 P.M. Took on 200 of coal. Sailing along very smoothly all day.

July Monday, 24 1865
 Passing up slowly. Come to Natchez at 10:30 A.M. Stayed but a short time there. Went up about 10 miles further and took 40 cords of wood, then going up smoothly. The weather fair.

July Tuesday, 25 1865
 This morning we come to Vicksburgh at 6 A.M. Crossed on the Louisiana side and took 1000 bushel of coal; then left going up slowly. The weather hot.

July Wednesday, 26 1865
 Ran all last night. Stopped this morning to fix the wheel. Then run till 5 oclock P.M. Come to Napoleon Run on till one and $\frac{1}{2}$ hour passed White River. The weather fair. Drew 10 days ration.

July Thursday 27 1865
 Still a climbing up the River slowly. Come to Hellena at 9 A.M. Stopped there awhile and then come on to Memphis at 12 P.M.. Coaled there and took on. The weather fair.

July Friday, 28 1865
 This morning took on some wood and then left for Cairo at 8 oclock A.M. Passed Ft. Randolph at 2 P.M. Run one hour and 17 minutes. Come to Ft. Pillow. Run til 11. Tied up. Stay there till morning.

July Saturday, 29 1865
 Started up this morning at 6 A.M. Running about 9 miles an hour. Come to New Madrid at 4 oclock and passed Island No. 10 at 5 P.M. To Cairo at 12 P.M. Lay there all night.

July Sunday, 30 1865
 Coaled, then started up the Ohio. Passed Mound City 8 Paducah at 11:50 A.M. Passed Smithland at 1:35 P.M. Passed Golconda at 4 P.M. Passed Cave in the Rock at 6 P.M.

July Monday, 31 1865
 Passed Hendersonville at 7 A.M. Evansville at 8:35, Owensborough at 2 P.M. Going along smoothly all day. Stopped to coal at Greenville at 6 P.M.

August Tuesday, 1 1865
 Landed at Jeffersonville at 2:30 P.M. Lay there till 5:50 Then we started for the City, Indianapolis. On the cars all night.

August Wednesday, 2 1865
 Arrived in Indianapolis at 2 after night. Lay at the depot till morning. I was detailed for fatigue. Took the baggage to Camp Carrington at 11 A.M.

August Thursday, 3 1865
 In camp all day and nothing particular going.. The most of the boys are going home. The weather warm. The heart is not level.

August Friday, 4 1865
 The City got up a dinner at the Soldiers Home but I did not go. Passed the next day off smoothly. It rained a shower.

August Saturday, 5 1865
 I went to town and got myself a suit. Passed off the day smoothly all right. The weather a little rainy.

August

Sunday, 6

1865

In the barracks all day. Nothing oarticular going on. Get our pay on Tuesday. That is the talk. Good night. The weather fair.

August

Monday, 7

1865

I went to town today to look at some clothing. The day passed off smoothly. The boys all come back this evening. Saw Henry Myers. The weather fair.

August

Wednesday 9

1865

Today 3 years was the last I worked; helped John (brother) to get away oats.
Come home from the war. Got home at 9 P.M. GOOD_BYE WAR

Rezin F. Mumma was born in Tuscarawas County, Ohio, on July 9, 1843, to Christian and Rebecca (Snyder) Mumma. Siblings were John Henry, George Washington, Malissa, Permella, Charles, Rebecca, Lydia, and Eliza. In 1851 the family moved to Adams County, Indiana. On March 28, 1867, Rezin married Ellen Sophia Steele. Ellen died July 17, 1918, and Rezin died in 1922. They were laid to rest in the Decatur Maplewood Cemetery. Rezin and Ellen were the parents of the following 12 children.

Idella Belle Mumma was born April 24, 1868. She married Lewis Harden on September 2, 1886.

Curtis Lawrence Mumma was born October 30, 1869. He married Effie Shackley on May 13, 1897.

Lockey Luella Mumma was born January 23, 1871, and died July 17, 1899. She married James N. Hert on April 28, 1873.

Levi Franklin Mumma was born February 26, 1873. He became a well-driller in the Decatur and Adams County area.

Sarah "Sadie" Rebecca Mumma was born July 5, 1875. She was married to Joseph G. Allehouse.

Permilla Ann Mumma was born July 16, 1877. She married Philip Auth on October 10, 1900.

Elsie Ellen Mumma was born December 16, 1879. She married Harvey Ferguson on July 3, 1900.
